
ad that announced the new MGs to the world—well Oxfordshire, at least. A century ago, the Oxford Isis newspaper carried an advertisement for a new car dubbed The Super Sports Morris.

Promising "Real Speed, Real Comfort, Distinguished Appearance, Beautiful Proportions and Superlative Paintwork" for £350, it was also the first known display of a simple, yet instantly memorable octagonal logo with the letters "MG" inside.





Two years later that "sporty" was developed into the MG that MG lovingly named "Old Number One". From one "Super Sports" in 1923, through great changes, to the MGC in 1967, to the 100th year with the new Cyberster in 2023, in its 101st year MG is staged to continue its legend into the next 100 historical years. We will be along for the ride.
