I'm not sure if this would be of interest to the other Rowdies, but I was just in Valparaiso Chile and came across this MG dealer! Do you know of any in the US? And are they



owned by SsangYong? Best, Andy Hoffman

Andrew,

These are neat pictures - seems so odd to see a modern MG dealership. Here's the story as best I can tell from various Wikipedia sources:

MG Rover in the UK went defunct in 2005 and Nanjing Auto purchased the right to MG and restarted sports car and saloon production in 2007. Nanjing in turn merged with SAIC, a state-owned Chinese auto headquartered in Shanghai, and one of China's big four automakers. Thus SAIC came to own the historic British brand MG with Nanjing as a subsidiary.

SsangYong Motor (which means double dragons) is the 4th largest Korean auto manufacturer. In 2004 SAIC took a 51% stake

of SsangYong and assumed control but continued operations under their name. That's how they came to be sold at that dealership.



MG, under Chinese ownership (Nanjing/SAIC), was launched in 2008 with the MG TF roadster. In 2011 mass production of MGs returned to the UK in Longbridge, under SAIC control, with the MG 6 model in GT (hatchback) and Magnette (saloon)



versions, which became the first new generation MG available in the UK since the MG TF. I believe the models you see at the dealership in Chile are the MG 6.

The MG range is now sold in China,

Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica and the UK, availability of models depending on market. Closer to home, in 2012 SAIC opened

an operations center in Birmingham, MI primarily for sourcing components. I am sending your photos to our editor along with the above for use in a future AAntics, likely a winter issue. when it is tough to find new stuff. Thanks for



sharing, maybe someday with the MI connection MG may return to these shores. Dave Quinn

They are fantastic cars offering great value for money".Coventry MG's appointment comes just as news broke that Autocar, one of the most respected automotive magazines in the world, included the new MG3 supermini in its list of 'The 50 Best Cars on Sale Today' putting it ahead of cars such as the Audi TT.

GT-40 IS REALLY COMING

GT-40 is getting closer and closer. It hit home for me at the end of GT-39 when I realized "We're Next". I hope this reminder isn't needed, but our fourth national GT will be in Frankenmuth, MI, from June 15 - 19, 2015. Our host hotel will be the Bavarian Inn Lodge. If you have an email address registered with the club, you should have received a message letting you know that online registration is now open for club members. The page will remain hidden until mid-January when registration will be opened up nationally.

There's been a lot of behind the scenes work going on and the schedule is essentially complete although needed changes still pop up. We're now up to six tech sessions with many other things in the schedule. These include taking a class in pretzel or streusel making, taking a ride on the "Bavarian Belle", enjoying dinner at the Frankenmuth Brewery, and so on. We'll also be celebrating the 60th anniversary of the MGA 1500. As part of that celebration, Forrest Johnson will be doing a 1955 MGA Walk Around Tour to point out differences unique to those early cars. The car show is planned for Wednesday morning with valve cover racing set to happen late that same morning. And, of course, the banquet will be on Thursday evening. You can keep up to date by keeping an eye on the GT-40 web site where the schedule is posted.

Going on throughout the week will be what we're calling the <u>Mighty Good Auction</u>. We hope to have all sorts of items available – from car items to arts & crafts items. You'll be able to bid on anything you have an interest in by purchasing tickets for the item. The more tickets you buy, the better your chances. Binding Brakes-reprinted from Chicagoland MG Club tech tips

Many MGA owners seem to be experiencing problems with the brakes 'binding', especially right after a brake system rebuild. The common complaint is that the brakes begin to drag as the car is driven, which creates tremendous heat and eventually stops the car, possibly damaging your new linings, pads, and discs.

The Factory Workshop Manual gives explicit instructions on setting the master cylinder pushrod, which sometimes cures the problem. However, even with the proper 'free play' in the pedal, the brakes can still bind up. The problem is that the master cylinder piston is not coming far enough forward to uncover the bleeder orifice that allows the expanded fluid to bleed into the reservoir.



Solution: Add a shim between the master cylinder block and the cover plate! This shim allows the piston to come a little further forward, thus uncovering the bleeder orifice.

I cut my shim from .020" brass shim stock using the gasket as a template, but allowing a 1.00" diameter clearance hole for the brake piston. I used two #180-020 gaskets, modifying one to include the 1.00" diameter hole, but leaving the other one standard.

Ed. note: A simpler solution that I found to this problem is simply to enlarge the hole in the cork gasket (see picture above) to allow the piston to go through the gasket and all the way forward.

Dave Quinn sends in this advice for a car hoist:

I got a note from a car buddy with a Honda S2000 who bought a Bendpak BL-5000 "Quick Jack". To me it is a 2 foot (well almost) car lift, rather than a jack. To quote him " My model is rated at 5,000 lbs but they also have a 3,500 unit named the BL-3500 for a couple of hundred dollars less. Mine was \$1,300 delivered to my garage. I got the 12V option so a marine group 29 battery and a tender added \$180. I am so in love with it. The danger is that it makes working on the car so easy that I spend all of my time in the garage."

He mentioned having information on a source for larger rubber blocks that he bought to replace the small ones that come with it. It looks good those who don't have high ceilings. It appears the Quick Jack sells under several Quick Jack labels. Here are links to videos:

Colour Tour-Take 2; 10-25-14





In the dark days of winter we always want the best garage lighting we can get. I have 12 doubleoverhead fluorescent lights in my garage and four corner ceiling lights as well. Still I want more when I'm doing mechanical work that's shaded or in the dark. In the past I used the old fashion caged light bulb on a cord. I tried halogen work lights on a stand but found them too bright and too hot. Until recently I used the fluorescent light on a cord. This Fall I was impressed with a work light a British Motor Club member was using at a tech session in his garage. I immediately bought one. It's a SMART brand 50 LED work light (180 lumens). Aside from the great lighting and small overall dimensions it has a 15-foot cord and a 2-1/4" adjustable magnet on the backside. I bought mine from Menards. Since then I use it all the time. It easily attaches to vehicle frames, under the dash, metal shelves, cabinets, etc. Being able to easily secure it and set the light direction is really handy. The magnet is so strong I covered it with duct tape to help slide it off the resting places. Here's a link if you are interested: http://www.menards.com/


When it comes to travel lights, LED flash lights just keep getting better and better. Back in 2011 I paid \$48 for a tiny 2" one that puts out three modes with the highest being 210 lumens. This Christmas Santa's helpers (grandkids) got me one from Tractor Supply that is approximate 3x2x1" square that is unreal. Since it is square you can rest it anywhere, plus it has a hook, a magnet and three lighting modes that is equal or better my \$48 light at one-sixth the cost.

Dave and Donna also arranged a special treat for all of us this year, in the form of a swinging, singing, musical ensemble who performed many of our favorite oldies and more to
























Recent Projects by Members
